Dear Chief Tetreault:

I am writing to express my appreciation and admiration for a member of your department, Lieutenant Theodore Cohen for his heroic actions on September 5, 2015. At approximately 0905 hours an emergency call came in to the Rockport Police Department Dispatch Center regarding a possible diver in distress off of Pebble Beach in the Town of Rockport. The dispatcher was advised that an off-duty Lieutenant from the Lynnfield Fire Department was on scene and would signal our officer upon their arrival. Rockport PD Sergeant Michael Marino responded to the scene and met with Lieutenant Cohen and the diver in need.

Lieutenant Cohen reported that the diver was approximately 40 yards off shore when he noticed he appeared to be struggling. He swam out and assisted the diver to shore, who had trouble breathing and was shaking. It was determined that his wet suit had a tear in it, which caused the wet suit to fill with water. Lieutenant Cohen's actions in all probability saved the diver's life.

Too often the great work of first responders goes unnoticed. Lieutenant Cohen's actions are deserving of recognition and therefore I want to commend him for his life saving efforts and assistance in ensuring the safety of the Rockport community during this incident.

Dear Mr. Crawford:

As you know, the City of Salem has been the Lead City for the federal Workforce Investment Act (WIA) for the North Shore region since its inception in 1998, managing the funding that supports the One Stop Career Centers, Youth Initiatives, Job Training, Labor Market Research and other workforce development efforts. As the Lead City, the Salem Mayor is the appointing authority to the Workforce Investment Board which is authorized to set policy and oversee the implementation of these programs. Through hard work and many willing partners, such as our municipal leaders, we have been successful in meeting and exceeding the placement and wage goals established by US DOL. Thank you for your help and support throughout this process.

In July of 2014, Congress passed and the President signed into law the new Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA), which modernized workforce development to better respond to our workforce needs as they exist now. WIOA is a great piece of legislation, allowing the WIBs and the municipalities within their regions to partner with business, education, and other organizations so quality programming can continue to have the positive impact that is so needed for a strong and growing economy.

WIOA requires that for funding to initially remain within the local region as designated under WIA, the Lead City for the region must request such designation. The governor, in turn, must approve this request if the region has successfully met its WIA goals for the past two years and has been determined to have fiscal integrity. Fortunately, this is the case on the North Shore, so the City of Salem submitted this request by June 12, as stipulated by the Governor's office. Initial designation will be for two years.

Designation beyond this initial two-year period requires the WIB, the City of Salem, Partner Cities, and others to develop a Regional Plan that ensures full coordination of workforce, education, economic development, and other services that comprehensively addresses the regional needs and ensures appropriate investment of federal dollars. This Plan involves developing industry sector initiatives, coordinating workforce-related issues such as transportation, and developing agreements with the Governor on performance accountability measures. It will be an interesting and, we hope, productive two year period!

As you can tell, WIOA is built on partnerships, and the first partnership is among the 19 cities and towns that represent the North Shore as designated by the Governor. It is important that the elected leaders of our entire region agree to work together to bring the appropriate services to job seekers and companies within their jurisdiction and within the North Shore as a whole.

Enclosed is an agreement, developed in accordance with WIOA, that describes the relationship among the City of Salem, the partner municipalities within the North Shore, and the WIB, which will guide our efforts over the next several years. Please review and let me know if you have any questions. Your signature on this agreement would be greatly appreciated.

Looking forward to hearing your thoughts on this, and on how we can continue to build upon our workforce endeavors well into the future.

Chief Elected Official Memorandum of Agreement for the

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act

Introduction

The municipalities within the North Shore Workforce Investment Board region enter into this agreement to form a partnership that will support workforce development efforts under the Federal Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act and related state and federal workforce-related opportunities.

The goal of this agreement is to ensure that elected leaders of the North Shore are actively engaged in:

- 1. supporting North Shore job seekers as they find and keep quality jobs in careers of importance to the North Shore economy, and
- 2. Supporting North Shore businesses as they seek to employ these job seekers in positions that are vital to the successful accomplishment of individual company mission and overall support of the North Shore economy.

Funding to carry out these activities is provided through WIOA and other grants made available to the region through other public and private sources. Services are provided to all job seekers across the region and to all companies located within this region.

By signing below, the elected leaders of the North Shore agree to collaborate and support the work required to build and maintain a strong workforce required for a healthy economy and high quality of life for all residents.

Parties to this agreement:

- 1. Mayor of Salem as lead elected official so designated by the Governor of the Commonwealth
- 2. The Mayors or Lead Elected Officials of the surrounding cities and towns within the North Shore region as designated by the Governor of the Commonwealth
- 3. The North Shore Workforce Investment Board, charged with carrying out the mandates of WIOA and related laws and programs designed to ensure a strong workforce within the region.

Roles and Responsibilities

- A. City of Salem as Lead City
 - 1. accepting responsibility for all WIOA and related workforce funding;
 - 2. providing fiscal oversight for these funds;
 - 3. providing technical assistance to WIB staff in the proper expenditure of funding;
 - 4. appointing members to the WIB in compliance with WIOA, ensuring that the WIB reflects North Shore critical and emerging industries and includes appropriate representation from other workforce partners;
 - 5. considering and seeking out nominations from the other Cities and Towns in this region for WIB membership;

- 6. communicating consistently with all North Shore cities and towns on the activities of the WIB;
- 7. in partnership with the WIB, leading the strategic Regional Planning with all stakeholders to ensure that the workforce needs of the region is met;
- 8. as determined through this Plan, provide needed supports to the WIB, including employing staff, purchasing good and services, providing insurance as needed, and generally carrying out the responsibilities commensurate with the role of fiscal agent. All costs associated with these services will be provided through grants received on behalf of the WIB.

B. Partner Cities and Town

- 1. participating in at least annual discussions with the City and WIB staff on WIB programming and services;
- 2. participating actively in our strategic Regional Planning process;
- 3. providing nominations to the Lead City for WIB membership;
- 4. referring companies within their municipal borders to the WIB for assistance on workforce issues as they arise;
- 5. referring job seekers to the WIB for services;
- 6. directing municipal staff, including planning, community development, and economic development staff, to utilize WIB services and products;
- 7. directing public schools within their jurisdiction to participate in WIB services.

C. WIB

- 1. providing updated labor market information for the WIB region as a whole;
- 2. providing LMI for individual cities and towns within the region as requested;
- 3. where possible and of mutual benefit, bringing services to job seekers and companies to the municipalities in access points of convenience;
- 4. directing and overseeing the strategic Regional Planning for the area;
- 5. work with municipal officials, including economic development, planning, community development, and education, to develop programs that respond to local and regional need;
- 6. providing periodic updates on WIB activities and results on the WIB website and in more formal documents as needed and requested.

By signing this agreement, all parties agree to carry out its tenants and to work together for strengthen and sustain the workforce system of the North Shore.





NOTICE OF FINAL DECISION FOR

PARSONS AVE

A public hearing was held on September 9, 2015 at 5:00 pm at the Town Hall for the removal of (7) public shade trees located on Parsons Ave as indicated by the Parsons Ave subdivision project plans and submitted by Hayes Engineering and Symes Development.

The following were in attendance:

Andrew Lafferty, DPW Director/Tree Warden Eric Lang, Hayes Engineering Jeff Rhuda, Symes Development Jane Bandini, Tree Committee Member Carol Kilroy, Resident of 9 Parsons Ave Bob Breslin, Resident of 56 Parsons Ave

Legal Notice was posted in accordance with MGL C87 Sec 3 to include 2 postings in the local newspaper and posted in the Town Hall and the DPW.

(7) Seven trees were identified for removal as indicated:

25" DBH Maple

34" DBH Pine

22" DBH Pine

26" DBH Maple

24.5" DBH Maple

12" DBH Pine

20" DBH Pine

The trees in question were noted to be mature pines and maples of relatively acceptable health although unmaintained with poor pruning cuts and previous breaks.

There were (3) three written objections received prior to hearing from the following: Denise Young 81 Perry Ave Don Gentile 8 Debston Lane Melanie Lovell 68 Bourque Rd

The property owner/developer requested permission to remove these trees in order to construct a driveway, realign the road, and build a dwelling with septic and drainage.

Mr. Rhuda and Mr. Lang described the need for removal was to allow access to the site and indicated the significant excavating and filling in the area under the tree canopies. This is required to construct the drainage system. Mr. Lafferty agreed that the work for the project will be a significant negative impact to the tree root system and the long term health of the trees. Mr. Lafferty expressed concern about the trees roots being damaged and the Town then being responsible in the future to deal with some very large trees that would need to be removed at the Towns expense. Ms. Bandini indicated that trees could survive through the construction if appropriate measures were taken. Ms. Kilroy appeared to be in favor of removing excessively large trees due to the hazard they could pose, but it is noted that an opionion was not stated outright. Mr. Breslin indicated that he would be favorable to the area being cleaned up and appeared satisfied with the additional tree plantings that would be part of the new construction. Mr. Lafferty asked what mitigation measures Symes/Hayes would consider, including providing additional trees for the Town, wither on Parsons Ave or elsewhere, as determined by the Town. Mr Rhuda indicated that would be an option they would consider.

DECISION:

Due to the fact that (3) three written objections were received, in accordance with MGL CH 87 Sec 4, "Tree wardens shall not ... grant a permit for the cutting down or removal of a public shade tree ... unless such cutting or removal or permit to cut or remove is approved by the selectman..." This request will be scheduled for the next Board of Selectman meeting on October 5 2015 to be held at the Al Merritt Center located at Market Street.

TREE WARDEN RECOMENDATION: 1.

Due to the nature of the work under the tree canopy and within the tree root system, It is my concern that these trees will be stressed and damaged to a point that sometime in the future these trees would become a hazard tree, at which point it would be the Town's responsibility to address and possibly remove at the Town expense.

It is also my opinion these trees are not good examples of street trees due to their size, location, species and potential negative impact to the infrastructure, utilizes, property and life.

It is the recommendation of the Tree Warden that the approval to remove the (7) seven indicated trees be granted. The requestor shall be responsible for all costs associated with cutting, removal; including stump removal.

It is also the recommendation of the Tree Warden to have the requestor, Symes Development, provide the Town (7) seven additional trees, including installation, not including trees proposed as part of the project. These trees are to be planted on Parsons Ave if possible or anywhere within the Town, as determined by the Tree Warden with input from the Tree Committee.

24-hour notification, prior to removal of the public shade trees, shall be given to the Tree Warden via the DPW. This is the final decision of the Tree Warden of the Town of Lynnfield and shall be posted on the Town Hall bulletin board, sent to persons present at the Public Hearing.

This Article would authorize the Board of Selectmen and Conservation Commission to sell the Parcel per the provisions of Massachusetts General Law Chapter 30B, as applicable, or other authority as may be applicable, upon such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen and Conservation Commission deem in the best interests of the Town, for not less than \$170,000 in replacement property and cash (i.e., the fair market value of the land and cash to be included shall together equal at least \$170,000) and for additional consideration of a permanent access easement, to the remaining portion of the 2.29 acre parcel owned by the Town and being known as the Bow Ridge Conservation Area, from Route One for recreational purposes in the Bow Ridge Conservation Area and Lynn Woods and to provide an easement for five parking spaces for recreational users of the Bow Ridge Conservation Area and further to authorize the Board of Selectmen to petition the General Court and seek legislative authorization for the aforesaid transfer and conveyance under Article 97 of the Articles of Amendment to the Massachusetts Constitution, if such approval is deemed by the Board of Selectmen to be necessary, or take any other action necessary, appropriate and relative thereto to permit the sale of the Parcel; or what action it will take thereon.

Signs shall neither contain moving elements nor convey the appearance of movement, whether by changing pixilation or any other physical or electronic representation of movement.

- 2.16.4 MISSING DEFINITIONS: Words not defined herein shall have the meaning as defined in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Building Code in effect on April 1, 2015.
